



Welcome to the Musée de Cluny, the French national museum of the Middle Ages!

Created in the 19th century, the museum boasts two exceptional buildings: the ancient baths of Lutetia (late 1st century AD) - one of the most important ancient edifices north of the Loire - and the private residence of the abbots of Cluny, the earliest example in Paris of a mansion with a courtyard in front and a garden in back (late 15th century). Embark on a journey through time as you explore 1,500 years of art and history in 22 rooms over two levels. Visitors are invited to follow a chronological and thematic route that showcases the diversity of the museum's collections: sculptures, goldsmithery, stained glass, paintings, tapestries, illuminated manuscripts, and everyday objects that offer a glimpse of all the richness and complexity of the medieval world. 

















Example 2 RECOMMENDED ITINERARY FOR PRM*:
Begin by visiting rooms ② and ③, then turn around and take elevator ☐ ↓ down to the Frigidarium ①. Take the platform lift ☑ to access rooms ④ and ⑤, then rooms ⑥ to ⑪.
Lastly, take elevator ☐ ↑ up to the 1st floor or to access the courtyard and café.
